What is Sociology?

Most simply put, Sociology is the study of society, institutions and social behavior.

Sociology is about analysing groups of people based on commonality. For example studying people in terms of culture, common territory, gender, race, disability, ethnicity and age.

Sociology is the study of structures, hierarchy and power in society. Sociologists study society to find and resolve social problems.

Overall, Sociology is an interesting and challenging subject which aims to discover how society works and affects people.

As a Sociology student you will:

- Explore and ask questions about our society
- Gain an understanding of how society is organised and be able to make sense of your own experiences in society
- Challenge common sense ideas and your own views

WHY IS SOCIOLOGY AN IMPORTANT SUBJECT?

- •Only by studying society can we hope to improve it.
- Understanding current trends allows us to anticipate future problems.
- Sociology allows us to understand our own lives and situations: we are the product of our society and so it is important to understand how it has socialised us.

What are sociologists interested in?

Sociology attempts to answer questions such as:

- · Are women and men now equal?
- What social factors influence our thoughts and behaviour?
 - · How have people's identities changed over the years?
 - Does violence in the media influence our behaviour?

A written assessment with a mix of short answer, structured questions and extended-response questions, all compulsory. The extended response questions will require candidates to draw together different areas of knowledge, skills and/or understanding from across the relevant specification content.

Critical Thinkers

In this course we ask important but perhaps sometimes controversial questions about the society around us. We aim to create critical thinkers by encouraging our students to always ask 'why'?

Sociology addresses 'important' questions such as:

- Why do girls generally perform better than boys in education?
- Why are there differences in educational attainment amongst different ethnicities and social classes?
 - Why do certain social groups commit more crime than others?
